James Bundy will speak about life in the theatre and selecting plays for the repertory season. Bundy spent his undergraduate days at Harvard and then trained at the London Academy of Music and Dramatic Art. He followed that by earning a master's degree from the Yale Drama School in 1995 and going on to work as an actor. Before assuming his dual role as Dean and Artistic Director in 2001, Bundy was artistic director of the Great Lakes Theatre Festival in Cleveland.

Being an ethical lawyer in an unethical world:
Resisting the pressure to conform

Michael C. Hamersley

*Formerly, Senior Manager, KPMG Mergers & Acquisitions Group
Expert on corporate tax shelters and abusive tax shelters*

Mike Hamersley is a recent addition to the California Franchise Tax Board's abusive tax shelter task force. Prior to joining the FTB in 2004, Mr. Hamersley was a senior manager in the Mergers & Acquisitions group of KPMG's tax practice where he provided planning advice, due diligence, and review of mergers, acquisitions, dispositions, and other corporate restructuring transactions. Mr. Hamersley questioned practices in the tax department at KPMG, was put on administrative leave, and subsequently filed suit against the firm in June 2003. He testified last October before the U.S. Senate Finance Committee regarding abuses in the tax shelter area. He also appeared on PBS' Frontline documentary "Tax Me If You Can," which examined the rampant abuse of tax shelters since the late 1990s. Mr. Hamersley earned his J.D. degree from Georgetown University in 1995.

Welcome back to Yale!

We look forward to all of you having a productive and exciting year. While you travel to classes, participate in extracurricular activities, and take part in social events, we hope that you will keep your own safety a priority. As you continue your studies at Yale and take advantage of the diverse opportunities that our vibrant urban university offers, we would like to reacquaint you with safety practices and services the University provides to help create and maintain a safe environment.

Campus safety is the primary job of the University Police Department and University Security Programs. The University Police Department, with 78 sworn officers, provides the kind of police services typically found in all urban communities. The University Security Programs Department, with a staff of 80 security officers, is responsible for the physical security of Yale's buildings, including residence halls.



Students have a role to play, as well, especially in taking the following precautions.

- Do not take unnecessary risks, such as walking alone.
- Obey the law: Avoid illegal drugs and alcohol (if you are under 21).
- Use the campus transportation services and security escorts.
- Lock your doors!
- Don't leave your laptop unattended!
- Get a cable lock for your computer.
- Get a good U-lock for your bike.
- Safeguard all personal property.
- Report any questionable activity or crime right away.

POLICE SERVICES

The Yale University Police Department is a full service police agency. University Police officers are armed and have full police powers, including the authority to make arrests throughout the City of New Haven. Headquarters is located at 98-100 Sachem Street with a sub-station at 258 Park Street. The Police Communications Center is located within Phelps Gate on College Street between Chapel and Elm Streets.

SECURITY BLUE PHONES

Approximately 250 exterior phones are strategically located throughout the campus and are readily identified at night by blue lights hanging above or near them. The phones are equipped with red emergency buttons for direct connection to the University Police for police, fire, or medical emergencies and a keypad for dialing any campus number.

Yale University provides several services to ensure that you may move about campus safely and efficiently. We request the cooperation of our community to use these services and to keep their own personal safety a priority.

GETTING AROUND: 2-WALK (2-9255)

Yale University employs a staff of trained Security Officers who work under the direction of University Security Programs. Easily identified by their black and gray uniforms, Security Officers perform a variety of services. One of the most popular is the Escort Service. You may request an escort directly by calling 432-WALK (432-9255). The officer will walk you to and from any point on campus 24 hours per day, seven days per week. Security Personnel carry two-way radios and are in continuous contact with the Central Alarm Station at 100 Church Street South.

YALE UNIVERSITY BUS SERVICES

The Parking and Transit Services Department, 155 Whitney Avenue (432-9790) is responsible for bus service provided to the Yale community via the Yale Shuttle Bus (daytime), the Yale Minibus (nighttime), and the Special Services Van. The daytime shuttle operates from 7:20 am to 6:00 pm Monday through Friday.

Yale Minibus (Nighttime) 432-6330

Buses run from 6:00 pm to 7:30 am Monday through Sunday (seven nights a week). This service runs on a scheduled route around the campus and also takes dispatched calls for off-route pickups. From 1:00 am to 7:30 am service is available on call-in basis only. Dial 2-6330 from any campus phone for service.

Special Services Van 432-2788

Yale Transit operates a Special Services Van which transports members of the Yale community who are permanently or temporarily disabled 24 hours a day Monday through Friday, and on Saturday and Sunday from 6:00 pm to 7:30 am. Passengers are picked up on request and transported within the boundaries. There is no daytime service on weekends.
